



OVERVIEW OF THE PROGRAM

KATS Theater is a highly motivating, hands-on learning program for students ages 7-13

- Two levels of classes are offered Elementary and Middle School
 - <u>Elementary</u> (grades 2-5): Instruction and assignments given in music, theater, science, history, as well as guidance/accountability in language arts and math.
 - Middle School (grades 6-8): Instruction and assignments given in all core subjects
 math, science, history, and language arts, as well as theater.
- Students attend classes once-a-week, then finish their assignments at home.
- The historical theater program provides performance opportunities that teach about history in different eras, cultures and regions of the world. The play scripts complement the history and literature studies conducted during the school year using this 4-year rotation cycle:

Ancient history <u>year 2019-20 and 2023-24</u>
Middle Ages, Renaissance and Age of Discovery <u>year 2020-21</u>
American history <u>year 2017-18 and 2021-22</u>
World cultures and geography <u>year 2018-19 and 2022-23</u>

PARENT PREPARTION FOR KATS CLASSES

The parent is an important piece in the teamwork needed to make the KATS program work. Here are basic requirements for parents to boost student learning:

1. Order textbooks early (See included booklist)

2. Schedule assignments weekly

Parents are encouraged to study the weekly assignment sheet the first class-day of each week and help the student schedule out the needed studies through the coming days. A form will be provided, or you can create your own.

3. Hold students accountable

Every day students should work on assignments for grammar, math, history, science, literature and memorization. As the student concludes daily studies, it is recommended that a visual display of the work is shown to one or the other parent. Have the student recite their lines for the drama class. Proofread essays or answers to literature / history questions to help with capitalization, spelling and punctuation. If the advisor requests for parents to correct work, do so daily to provide quick feedback for accurate learning.

4. Sign the Assignment Sheet weekly

- The night before class is ideal for reviewing the assignment sheet once more to make sure everything was completed.
- Write the pages that were completed for grammar and math that week.
- Write the name of the book that the student is reading.
- Place all work together in one spot so it is easily find-able in the morning.
- If there are any questions along the way, email the advisor or write them on the assignment sheet that is being returned.

STUDENT PREPARATION FOR CLASSTIME

1. Work on assignments daily

Students should have time they can count on each day to work on assignments and memorization. Be consistent with a daily work schedule. Learning happens when concepts are reinforced with repetition and quick feedback. If the advisor requests for parents to correct work, have them do so daily.

2. Check-in on Wednesday morning

When students arrive on Wednesday morning, they will be asked to turn in their completed assignment sheet and to recite the lines they memorized. If props or costume pieces are brought, students will earn points for those as well as for assignments brought to class. The points awarded can be used for class time snack items. We will also keep track of overall points earned and awards will be handed out at the final performance of each season.

3. Class time activities

There will be a variety of activities involved during each class. Sometimes group work will be required, or props assembled by the students. Usually rehearsal of memorized lines, quizzes or exercises to be completed, and drama or voice projection practice are scheduled. Whatever is occurring, students should plan to give their best effort and focus. Phones can be distracting, so they must be silenced and unavailable during class.

4. Assignment Sheet

The KATS assignments sheet packet is given to each student during class time. Theater, science, math, language arts, and history assignments will all be listed and scheduled out for the week. If a student misses class or misplaces the assignment sheet, another can be downloaded from the website www.homelinkyakima.org

5. Do not miss class if at all possible.

Students are encouraged to attend class every week. If a time out of town needs to be scheduled, consider the week-long breaks between quarters. For doctor appointments etc., aim first for a different day of the week. Every practice time is important to build teamwork and all are needed at every rehearsal for the performance to mesh on time.

It is especially important for students to be present during the performance weeks.

Please do not schedule trips away when performances are planned.
